## Syllabus - Math 1113 – Math for General Education Fall 2011

**Course Description:** This course surveys mathematical topics that are not intended as a preparation or substitute for College Algebra. Topics include sets, logic, probability, statistics, matrices, geometry, numeration systems, number systems, and the real number system.

**Prerequisites:** Three units of high school mathematics or intermediate algebra.

**Text:** Mathematical Excursions, 2<sup>nd</sup> ed. Aufmann et al. Houghton Mifflin, Boston 2004.

## **Course Objectives:**

- 1. To help students to develop an appreciation for the scope and impact of Mathematics as a human endeavor and as an important influence in their lives.
- 2. To involve students in a variety of mathematical topics as they apply to understanding their financial, cultural, technological, and physical surroundings.
- 3. To improve students' ability to use mathematical tools in exploring and understanding their world.

**Student Objectives:** Upon completion of this course the student should be able to:

- 1. Identify the sets of integer, rational, and real numbers and perform basic calculations with them.
- 2. Assess probabilities and risks.
- 3. Interpret basic statistical statements.
- 4. Use a calculator and/or spreadsheet program to perform basic financial calculations pertinent to informed consumer participation in local, national, and foreign economies.
- 5. Recognize and interpret common phenomena as modeled by linear, quadratic, logarithmic, or exponential functions.
- 6. Recognize that mathematics has a wider scope extending beyond arithmetic calculations and solution of algebraic equations.

**Evaluation:** There will be an in-class quiz every week and 3 in-class exams. Suggested problems from the text will be issued after every class period. The quizzes will consist of 3-5 questions which will be closely related to the suggested homework assignments. There will be absolutely NO MAKEUP QUIZZES. Your two lowest quiz grades will be dropped.
